## **Scout Oath**

On my honor I will do my best to do my duty to God and my country and to obey the Scout Law; to help other people at all times; to keep myself physically strong, mentally awake, and morally straight.

The life lessons rooted in the Scout Oath and Scout Law stay with a Scout forever.

We know that kids do not join Cub Scouting for character building. Youth join because it is fun. Your child will learn great lessons, but they will be far too busy having fun to notice.

On behalf of the Pack Committee and the Pack Leadership, I'd like to welcome you to Cub Scouts. I hope it instills in you and your family the same lifelong love for Scouting America as it has in me and my family.

# What Is the Vibe?

Our Pack culture is rooted in four main areas:

- Accessibility
- Laws, Oaths, and Uniforms
- Non-Violent and Compassionate
- Safety First

## Accessibility

At Pack 334, we are committed to making Scouting as accessible as possible. Our goal is simple: if a child wants to be a Scout, they should be able to be one—with us.

We don't shy away from cultural differences—we celebrate them.

We don't see neurodiversity as a challenge—we see it as an opportunity to better understand and support every child. We strive to meet each Scout where they are, ensuring they have meaningful, enriching experiences just like anyone else.

We also value and welcome parent advocacy. Your insights help us better support your child, and we are always willing to work with you to provide the accommodations and encouragement they need to thrive in Scouting.

## Laws, Oaths, and Uniforms

Our program places a strong emphasis on structure—through the Scout Oath, the Scout Law, and the wearing of uniforms. These elements provide a solid framework that supports our Scouts as they grow, offering a sense of belonging and connection to something larger than themselves. They help create a shared identity and common purpose.

Uniforms are a key part of this structure. They set Cub Scouts apart from school, home, and sports, creating a distinct space for learning and growth. Just as importantly, uniforms are democratic—everyone wears the same thing, regardless of background, which fosters equality and unity.

For many children, wearing the same uniform and embracing shared ideals helps them feel accepted and valued as part of a unique and meaningful community.

While all 12 points of the Scout Law matter, we recite them each week to keep them top of mind. In Pack 334, we especially emphasize being **Helpful, Friendly, Courteous, and Kind**—values that shape how we treat one another and the world around us.



## **Non-Violent and Compassionate**

Our Cub Scouts are encouraged to live by the values of kindness, respect, and compassion, always striving to treat others as they would like to be treated.

Scouts learn that true strength comes not from fighting or being aggressive, but from helping, understanding, and supporting those around them.

Through activities, service projects, and teamwork, Cub Scouts practice peaceful problem-solving and empathy, showing that being a good Scout means being caring, inclusive, and nonviolent in both words and actions.

## **Safety First**

We welcome Scouts from kindergarten through fifth grade—a time full of wonder, discovery, and growth. These years are magical, but they're also some of the most vulnerable in a child's life.

Cub Scouts is not about proving toughness or testing survival skills. While adventure and challenge are a part of Scouting, those high-risk experiences are more appropriate for older youth in the Scouts BSA Troop. Our focus in Cub Scouts is on safety, learning, and fun.

We always prioritize safety and will err on the side of caution:

- Events will be canceled promptly if weather conditions are unpleasant or pose any risk.
- All activities require a sufficient number of trained adult leaders—if we don't have them, we will not proceed.
- We emphasize first aid readiness and live by the Scouts BSA motto: "Be Prepared."



# **How Does Cub Scouts Work?**

In Cub Scouts, you and your family join the program with your child, and you will help them along the way. Cub Scouts have a different handbook at each grade level, with Adventures that are age-appropriate for their developmental level. As your child advances through these books by working on Adventures, they will earn badges and other recognition that they wear on their uniform. As your child grows in Cub Scouting, your role will change with them, from handson involvement to guiding and coaching. Your child's success in Cub Scouting depends on you!

The Cub Scouting program takes place at two levels. Your child will be a part of a Den or a Patrol, a small group of Cub Scouts in the same grade level. All Dens/Patrols, from kindergarten through fifth grade, make up a Pack.

The Dens, with their families, come together at meetings, where they play games, work on Adventures, and receive positive reinforcement for their achievements.

## The Lion (Kindergarten) and Tiger (1st Grade) Dens

In kindergarten or first grade, Cub Scouts join with an adult partner, usually the parent or guardian. An adult is selected to serve as the Den Leader (usually one of the parents) and coordinates the meetings. Each adult partner takes a turn assisting the den leader. This shared leadership model is a great way to ensure the den leader has the help needed to deliver a quality program. At den meetings, Lions and Tigers work on Adventures, which can be found in their handbooks and the Adult Partner Guides.

## Wolf (2nd Grade), Bear (3rd Grade), and Webelos (4th Grade) Dens

Children this age are becoming more independent, and activities are designed to meet their developmental needs. A Wolf (second grade), Bear (third grade), or Webelos (fourth grade) Den is ideally no more than eight Cub Scouts, a Den Leader, an Assistant Den Leader (usually parents of some of the den members), and often a Den Chief (an older Scout who helps the den leader).

## The Arrow of Light Scout Patrol (5th Grade)

The Arrow of Light Patrol is focused on preparing to join Scouts BSA. At the end of the program year, Arrow of Light Scouts "bridge over" to the next level of Scouting, Scouts BSA.

## The Pack

The Cub Scout Pack comprises all the Dens/Patrols, led by the Pack Leadership (Cubmaster, Assistant Cubmaster, and Den Leaders) and the Pack Committee.

Our Pack is Cub Scout Pack 334.



# **What Do These Words Mean?**

## **Organization Names**

Scouting has undergone some changes since it was created in 1910. The original organization was called the Boy Scouts of America, and Scouts were called Boy Scouts. However, as the organization has grown, the names have grown.

The national organization recently changed its name from the Boy Scouts of America to Scouting America, and the Boy Scouts have changed their name to Scouts BSA.

Within Scouting America, there are several different types of Scout units: Cub Scouts (grades K-5), Scouts BSA (ages 11-17), Venturing (ages 14-20), Sea Scouts (ages 14-20), and Exploring (ages 10-20).

Scouting America is organized into local Councils across the country, and each Council is organized into regional Districts. Charter Organizations within each District sponsor various Scout units.

Our Scouting America units are Cub Scout Pack 334 and Scouts BSA Troop 334. Our Charter Organization is Leverington Church, and we are part of the Northern District in the Cradle of Liberty Council.

## **Jargon Definition List**

Like any organization, Cub Scouts has unique words and phrases. Here are some of them:

#### **Adventures**

Cub Scouts earn Adventures that are specific to their grade and rank. Several Adventures must be completed to earn the rank badge for each grade level.

#### **Annual Dues**

We collect dues from each family every year to cover the costs of awards and recognition, crafts, and special events. We offer opportunities to conduct fundraisers to offset these costs. The Pack Committee establishes and approves the dues each year, and they are collected from families at the beginning of the program year each fall.

#### **Arrow of Light**

The Arrow of Light is both a rank and an award. It is the highest achievement in Cub Scouts and the only Cub Scout Award that can still be worn on the uniform after a Cub Scout joins a Scouts BSA troop.



## Blue and Gold Banquet

The Blue and Gold Banquet is a tradition in Cub Scout packs. Traditionally, the Blue and Gold Banquet is a celebration of the anniversary of the founding of the BSA on February 8, 1910, and therefore usually takes place in February. We hold our Blue and Gold Banquet at the end of the year, where we award rank badges and recognize our leaders and volunteers. The highlight of the event is having our Arrow of Light Patrol participate in a special "bridging over" ceremony where our 5th graders leave Cub Scouts and cross over to a Scouts BSA Troop. Community leaders and special guests are invited to attend. A special meal is provided for everyone to enjoy together. Our Blue and Gold Banquet is one of our most significant events of the year.

## **Bridging Over**

During our Blue and Gold Banquet, our Arrow of Light Scouts participate in a special ceremony celebrating their crossover from Cub Scouts to Scouts BSA each year. The ceremony, which is conducted with representatives from both the Pack and the Troop using a ceremonial bridge, is the highlight of the Blue and Gold Banquet.

## **Charter Organization**

The Charter Organization is the local community organization that partners with Scouting America to deliver a Scouting program. They support Scouts in serving the community's youth. A Charter Organization usually supplies meeting space and other resources. Our Charter Organization is Leverington Church.

## **Chartered Organization Representative**

This person appoints the Pack Committee Chair and approves all adult leaders. They provide resources from the Chartered Organization. Our Charter Organization Representative is John Craighead.

## Class A Uniform

Our standard Cub Scout uniform includes the official den hat, Scout shirt, neckerchief and slide, and Scout belt. Official Scout pants, shorts, and socks can be purchased, but our Pack does not require these. We wear Class A uniforms for most meetings and events.

#### **Class B Uniform**

Our alternate uniform consists of the official den hat and our Pack T-shirt. Neckerchiefs can be worn with the Pack T-shirt. We wear Class B uniforms for specific meetings and events, as determined by Leadership.

### Council

Scouting serves young men and women in every part of the country through local council service centers. Each Council helps chartered organizations use the Scouting program effectively and expand its use to other community groups. Our Council is the Cradle of Liberty Council (colbsa.org).

#### **Court of Honor**

A Court of Honor is another name for a Pack Meeting.

## Cubmaster

The Cubmaster is the leader of the Pack during meetings and events. In addition to serving as the main point of contact and the master of event ceremonies, the Cubmaster supports Den Leaders.



#### Den/Patrol

Cub Scouts are organized by grade into units called dens. An adult Den Leader and other parents lead each Den. Together, they plan and carry out a year-round program of activities for the Den. Many parents serve as Den Leaders or Assistant Den Leaders. The Cub Scout Dens are Lion (kindergarten), Tiger (first grade), Wolf (second grade), Bear (third grade), Webelos (fourth grade). Arrow of Light Scouts (fifth grade) are organized into a Patrol instead of Den.

#### **Den/Patrol Leader**

An adult, usually a parent, volunteers to serve as a Den or Patrol Leader. They carry out activities related to Adventures, as presented in the Den. Each Den/Patrol should have its own Leader.

## **District**

A Scouting district is a geographical area of the Council. District leaders mobilize resources to ensure the growth and success of Scouting units within the District's territory. The District aims to work through chartered organizations to organize and support successful Scouting units. Our District is the Northern District.

## Flag Retirement Ceremony

The Flag Retirement Ceremony is an annual service provided to the community. We take unserviceable flags collected over the past year and conduct a ceremony in Gorgas Park to properly dispose of them.

## **Fundraising**

Fundraising efforts are an essential aspect of our Pack's operations. We cap our annual dues at a specific amount each year, and that amount does not cover all expenses for all events. We conduct fundraising programs throughout the year to cover the gap.

#### Handbook

At the beginning of the program year, each Cub Scout receives an interactive handbook specific to their Den/Patrol. The handbook is a fun-filled activity guide where Scouts can explore and enjoy the required and elective Cub Scout Adventures designed for their Den/Patrol. Each activity introduces new topics or fulfills requirements for specific Adventures.

#### Hike-A-Thon

The Hike-A-Thon is an annual fundraiser organized by the Cradle of Liberty Council each Spring. Cub Scouts seek out financial donations from friends and families and then go on hikes. The financial support is split between the Council (45%) and the Pack (55%). Over the past few years, this event has proven to be our biggest fundraiser of the year.

## **Neckerchief**

A neckerchief consists of a triangular piece of cloth or a rectangular piece folded into a triangle. The long edge is rolled towards the point, leaving a portion unrolled. The neckerchief is then fastened around the neck with the ends clasped with a slide. Around the globe, this piece of cloth is often the primary identifier that someone is a Scout. Each Den/Patrol in Cub Scouts has its neckerchief color (when Cub Scouts become members of Scouts BSA in Troop 334, there is a custom-designed neckerchief for the whole Troop). Leaders can wear the official Cub Scout Leader neckerchief or any other Scouting America-approved neckerchief. Every new Cub Scout receives a neckerchief when they join, and every Cub Scout in our Pack gets a new neckerchief for their new rank at the annual Blue and Gold Banquet. We wear neckerchiefs with our Class A uniform and sometimes with our Class B uniform.



#### **Neckerchief Slide**

A small, usually metal, device designed to hold a neckerchief on by pulling the neckerchief ends through and sliding the device up to the uniform shirt collar. Each Den/Patrol has its own neckerchief slide, but Scouts can wear anything as a neckerchief slide. Many Scouts make their own slides from wood or braided cord.

#### Pack

The Pack comprises all the Dens/Patrols, the Pack Leadership, and the Pack Committee. It is led by the Pack Committee, which oversees administrative functions and conducts the Cub Scout program with the Chartered Organization.

### **Pack Committee**

Cub Scouting is run by a volunteer team of Cub Scout parents or guardians and other caring adults who agree to take on administrative roles that best fit their talents. Together, this team makes up the Pack Committee. Every Pack has a Pack Committee comprising at least three members (Chair, Secretary, and Treasurer). By handling administrative and support tasks, the Pack Committee allows the Cubmaster, Den Leaders, and their Assistants to focus on working directly with the Cub Scouts. Our Committee meets monthly on the third Wednesday of the month.

#### **Pack Meeting**

The Pack Meeting brings together Scouts from every Den/Patrol, their Leaders, and families for a large-scale event showcasing all the Scouts have learned and done with their Dens. We usually hold several Pack Meetings each year and refer to them as a Court of Honor.

#### **Patrol**

Arrow of Light Scouts (fifth grade) are organized into a Patrol, instead of Den. As these Scouts prepare to bridge over into Scouts BSA at the end of the year, this terminology is aligned with how a Scouts BSA Troop is organized.

#### **Pinewood Derby**

Cub Scouts work together with a parent or guardian to build their own custom race cars! Scouts begin with an official Pinewood Derby car kit. We help them learn to create a design, carve it, and detail it with paint, decals, and other accessories. Finally, we teach Scouts to perfect strategies and compete in our annual Pinewood Derby. Our Pinewood Derby is held on a Saturday in the Spring. It is a massively exciting day and one of our most significant events of the year. Read about a previous year's Pinewood Derby.

## Rank / Rank Badge / Badge of Rank

Cub Scout activities center around earning badges specific to each school grade level. Each badge represents a rank. Badges are awarded at the end-of-year Blue and Gold banquet and worn on the uniform shirt's left pocket. The Cub Scout Ranks are Lion (kindergarten), Tiger (first grade), Wolf (second grade), Bear (third grade), Webelos (fourth grade), and Arrow of Light (fifth grade).

#### Recharter

The charter is a formal agreement allowing the Charter Organization (Leverington Church) to use the Scouting America programs to serve youth in its community. Scouting America requires that the charter be renewed annually to continue using the programs. Each unit (Cub Scout Pack 334 and Scouts BSA Troop 334) must complete a renewal each year; we call that annual renewal "recharter."



## **Scouting For Food**

Scouting For Food is a national event that takes place each November and is one of America's most extensive food drives. Across the country, it supports local food pantries and hunger relief agencies. The event occurs each year on two Saturdays before Thanksgiving. On one Saturday, we canvas specific streets in Roxborough and leave a flyer announcing the program. The following Saturday, we collect donations from those streets and bring them to a collection point. Later in that day, Philabundance arrives with large trucks and brings all the donated food to its local food pantries.

#### **Scout House**

The Roxborough Scout House is an actual house and land in Roxborough that the Cradle of Liberty Council owns. Located next to Saul High School's fields on Henry Avenue (726 Wigard Ave, Philadelphia, PA 19128), we use this space several times a year for ceremonies and camping.

#### Scout Life Magazine

Scout Life (formerly Boys' Life) is Scouting America's monthly magazine. Its target readers are children between the ages of 6 and 18. Subscriptions can be purchased when registering for Scouts. We highly encourage each Scout to subscribe; the magazine supports and reinforces the Scouting program at home and provides a fun and informative view of the world.

## **Scout Sunday**

A Sunday in February, when we celebrate Scouting America's birthday with our Charter Organization, Leverington Church. We usually participate in a service project on the Saturday before, where we spruce up areas of Leverington Church as a thank-you for their support. Then, on Sunday, our Cub Scout Pack and Scouts BSA Troop join an optional religious service at Leverington Church.

# When Do We Meet?

Our program year runs from September through May. Our primary meeting place is at Leverington Church, 6301 Ridge Ave, Philadelphia, PA 19128 (across from Gorgas Park & the Roxborough Library).

## **Regular Meetings**

Regular Meetings are held on Fridays from 7:00 p.m. – 8:30 p.m. Parents of Lion (K) and Tiger (1st grade) Scouts must stay with their Scout throughout the meeting and be prepared to provide assistance to their Scout as needed; all other parents are invited to stay.

Meetings begin at 7:00 p.m., usually in the large hall on the main floor of the building, Westminster Hall. We open the meeting together as a Pack with general announcements. After announcements, the Pack usually breaks out into Dens/Patrols. Pack Leadership runs a program for the Scouts to complete the advancement requirements in their handbook.

We close the formal meeting as a Pack around 8:00 p.m., usually in Westminster Hall. Scouts may depart with their parents then, or, if Leadership can facilitate organized play in the gym, final dismissal will be from the gym around 8:30 p.m.

## **Courts of Honor**

A Court of Honor is held every few months on a Friday instead of a regular meeting. We invite parents, siblings, grandparents, extended family, and friends to attend. This event is an awards ceremony to recognize the Scouts' achievements, and afterward, everyone enjoys social time and refreshments. Families usually sign up to bring food and drink.

## **Leader and Committee Meetings**

The Leader and Committee meeting is on the third Wednesday of every month. The Leader meeting begins at 7:00 p.m. for Pack Leadership to plan and organize the program. The Committee meeting starts at 8:00 p.m. for the Pack Committee to discuss program and financial updates, and review the calendar and leadership changes. All parents and leaders are invited to attend the Committee meetings.

## **Parent Meetings**

Parent meetings are usually held in the Fall and Spring on a Friday during a regular meeting. The Den Leaders run a program for all Scouts in a separate space, and the Cubmaster meets with parents to discuss how things are going and what is coming up.



# **How Can I Help?**

The most important help that you, as a parent or guardian, can give your child is to work with them on their Cub Scouting Adventures as they work toward their badge of rank. The Cub Scout handbook is full of age-appropriate activities; some of them you do together at home. Den/Patrol meetings are designed for Cub Scouts to complete the Adventures required to earn their rank badge. When you have completed a requirement at home, ensure your Den Leader is informed so they can properly record it and your child can be recognized for their achievements.

Your role as a parent is the secret to a successful Cub Scouting program! The Den/Patrol and the Pack rely on parent participation to run a successful program. Cub Scouting operates through volunteer leadership. Volunteer leaders are an example of Scouting's principle of service to others. By volunteering in Scouting, you are also giving your child and family the gift of your time. What could be more valuable? You will have an opportunity to be a positive influence in their life and in the lives of their friends.

Here are some of the ways you could volunteer:

## **Pack Leadership**

Many parents support the Pack by stepping up to be part of the Pack Leadership team. As a leader, you get the privilege of working directly with the youth in our community. The Pack is always looking for more leaders!

- Den/Patrol Leader and Assistant Den/Patrol Leader: The Den/Patrol Leaders
  use the Den/Patrol meeting resources to lead the Den/Patrol at Den/Patrol
  meetings and attend the monthly Pack Committee meeting.
- Cubmaster and Assistant Cubmaster: The Cubmaster helps plan and carry out the Pack program with the help of the Pack Committee.

## The Pack Committee

Every Cub Scout parent or guardian is invited to join the Pack Committee. Pack Committee members perform the administrative functions of the Pack. The Committee meets on the third Wednesday of each month and includes the responsibilities below. The Pack is always looking for more Committee Members!

- Committee Chair: The Committee Chair presides at all Pack Committee meetings. Helps recruit adult leaders and attends the monthly Pack and Committee meetings.
- Advancement Chair: The Advancement Chair maintains advancement records for the Pack. Orders and obtains all badges and insignia. Attends the monthly pack meeting and Pack Committee meeting.
- **Secretary:** The Secretary keeps records of the pack committee meetings and communicates with families about upcoming pack events and activities.
- **Treasurer:** The Treasurer keeps all financial records for the Pack, including the Pack bank account, and gives a monthly financial report to the Pack Committee. Attends events and the monthly Pack Committee meeting.
- Committee Member: Serving as a general Committee Member is one of the
  most important ways a person can help the Pack. Committee Members help
  create the Pack's culture and vibe and can influence all aspects of the program.

## **Youth Protection**

Child abuse is a serious problem in our society, and unfortunately, it can occur anywhere, even in Scouting. Youth safety is of paramount importance to Scouting.

For that reason, Scouting America continues to create barriers to abuse beyond what has previously existed in Scouting. Scouting America places the most significant importance on providing the most secure environment possible for its youth members. To maintain such an environment, Scouting America has developed numerous procedural and leadership selection policies and provides parents and leaders with multiple online and print resources for all Scouting programs.

All leaders are required to complete Youth Protection Training. All parents are encouraged to take the Youth Protection Training. To complete the training online, go to <a href="mailto:my.Scouting.org">my.Scouting.org</a> and establish an account using the member number you received when registering for Scouting America membership. If you take the training online before obtaining a member number, return to <a href="mailto:my.Scouting.org">my.Scouting.org</a> and enter your number for training record credit. Your Scouting America local council also provides regular training if you cannot take it online.

Youth Protection Training must be taken **every year**. If a volunteer's Youth Protection Training record is not current at the recharter, the volunteer will not be registered.

Pack 334 feels strongly that wearing uniforms is an essential part of Scouting and encourages all Scouts and Leaders to wear uniforms at all activities, events, trips, and functions.

## **Class A Uniform**

- Official Den/Patrol Hat
- · Official Scout Shirt
- Official Den/Patrol Neckerchief
- Neckerchief Slide
- Official Scout Belt

Blue Cub Scout shirt: Lion\*, Tiger, Wolf, Bear, and Webelos Scouts

Tan Cub Scout shirt: Arrow of Light Scouts

\*Lions can also wear the official Lion T-Shirt, but we advise parents to purchase the Blue Cub Scout shirt instead, as the Lion T-Shirt only lasts one year. A Scout is Thrifty!

## Class B Uniform

- Official Den/Patrol Hat
- Pack Class B Shirt

Usually, we wear Class A unless Leadership directs otherwise.

## **Patch Placement**

Pack 334 will provide you with the patches you need for your Scout's uniform, including:

- The Council Should Emblem
- Pack Unit Number
- Rank Badges
- Pins and Awards
- Event / Temporary Patches

Cub Scout patches have very specific locations on the Cub Scout shirt. Inside your Scout's Den Handbook is a diagram showing what goes where. On the next page are some notes on where patches go. Please ask any leader or "veteran" parent if you have questions!



## **Left Sleeve Patch Placement**

Let's start with the left sleeve. Your Council shoulder emblem goes at the very top along the shoulder seam.

Below the Council shoulder emblem is the Pack Unit Number patch; they should be so close that they touch. Our pack number is 334.

## Right Sleeve Patch Placement

The American flag is sewn on the right sleeve of the Cub Scout uniform at the top. The flag will likely be sewn on already.

#### **Left Pocket Patch Placement**

The World Crest is worn above the left pocket, centered between the left shoulder seam and the top of the left pocket.

If a Cub Scout has earned the Religious Emblem for their religion, they are worn over the left pocket.

On the blue Cub Scout shirt, the rank badges go on the left pocket in this order, so each diamond patch becomes part of a larger diamond.:

- Lion badge goes at the 12:00 Position
- Tiger badge goes at the 9:00 Position
- Wolf badge goes at the 6:00 Position
- Bear badge goes at the 3:00 Position

The Webelos badge is centered on the left pocket of the tan Cub Scout shirt.

## **Right Pocket Patch Placement**

Patches handed out for events (Scouting for Food, Hike-A-Thon, etc.) are worn on the right pocket.

If your Scout earns the Recruiter patch, it is worn directly below the right pocket.



# **How Much Does Cub Scouts Cost?**

For the 2025-2026 program year, we were able to lower dues to \$260, as well as offer a 5% discount for families who pay in full no later than October 3, 2025.

Our Annual Dues for the 2025-2026 program year are \$285. Each Scout earned a \$25 discount from last Spring's Hike-A-Thon, bringing the total amount due for each Scout to \$260.

We have capped the annual dues to limit the cost to families. However, additional fundraising or donations may be requested to help with other events like camping trips, award ceremonies, and field trips.

**Returning Scouts:** This year, we are offering three ways to pay Annual Dues:

- 1. You can pay in full, online, right now, and receive a 5% discount\*.
- 2. You can pay in full with cash/check in person, and receive a 5% discount\*.
- 3. You can pay monthly, <u>online</u>, starting today with a \$30 deposit. Your remaining balance will be divided into monthly payments between next month and April 2026. Monthly payments must be paid online.

**New Scouts:** You'll register directly with <u>Scouting America online</u>. You will pay a portion of your Annual Dues (\$113.30) directly to Scouting America when you register, and we will invoice you for the remaining balance (\$146.70) once we receive your registration.

**Financial Support:** We want every child who wants to be a Cub Scout to be part of our Pack. The Pack stands ready to provide financial help on a case-by-case basis. Please complete this online Financial Support Application to get started.
